Part Two: The Assignment

- <u>Create a Speech</u>. Choose THREE of the following speech options, or you can combine all four!
 - <u>Connect</u> [WHO]: Who is the main character in the text? Who is the enemy or villain? Who do you know in real life or from another book that is like the main character? Who do you know in real life or from another book that is like the enemy/villain?
 - <u>Evaluate</u> [HOW]: How did the author develop the story? What techniques did the author use to connect the dots?
 - <u>Identify</u> [WHAT]: What are the big ideas? What messages did you take away? What did you learn from reading? What themes exist?
 - <u>Opportunity:</u> If you could change any one thing in the text, whether it is a person, event or place, what would the change be and why would you make it?
