ast month, as part of our social studies unit on civics, third grade visited the City of Orlando Mayor's office and sat in on a city hall meeting, toured Mayor Dyer's offices and met a variety of city workers. We wrote letters to Mayor Dyer and we received letters back in the mail a couple weeks ago! The class was thrilled! Last month, we also took a guided walking tour of the City of Orlando, and took a trip to the Orange County Courthouse. At the courthouse, we toured the building, participated in a mock trial with Judge Carsten. All students were able to sit in the courtroom and view behind the scenes areas such as the jail cells behind the courtrooms and jury deliberation rooms. We will be visiting the Orange County Mayor's office and the Regional His-tory center at the end of April. We are participating in a mock trial at the History center to better understand the judicial system. Our class received a grant from Mayor Teresa Jacob's office to attend the History Center for free!

April is National Poetry Month, and this year marks the 20th anniversary! This month, we have been learning about different types of poetry, analyzing poetry and have celebrated by reading and writing a different poem each day in class. Students have been exposed to poetry classics such as Edgar Allen Poe, Lewis Carroll and Shel Silverstein, among many others! Our class is entering poetry to Creative Communications, which offers a poetry contest and the Orange County Library 'Celebrate Your World With Poetry' Kids Poetry Contest. Additionally, we are celebrating with Poem in Your Pocket Day on 04/21. On this day people celebrate poetry by selecting a poem, carrying it with them and sharing it with others throughout the day.

In science, we are studying life cycles of plants and animals and have planted watermelon, cucumber, cilantro and flowers in the classroom. Thank you to all the families who donated soil and seeds! We are charting their growth every couple days. We have 3 caterpillars in our classroom and are anxiously waiting to see their metamorphosis. We received a red eared slider turtle as a gift from the Benbrahim family who saved the turtle from their pool! He has made himself at home in our class fish tank. Also, a big thank you to the Hillerman family who brought in minnows for the class to observe in our second fish tank, which was donated by the Pack family. We also have tadpoles and mealworms on order and we will be observing the frog and mealworm life cycle in the classroom. At the end of the year, students will have the option to take home our class pets to continue caring for them after the students move on to 4th grade.



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The Gradeless Pilot Program By Arlyned Delgado

o grades? Yes, that's right! The gradeless pilot program is a program that doesn't give you grades! Instead, your teacher and your peers give you feedback and comments. For some people, that sounds perfect. But not for everyone. Whatever you think about no grades, I will show you why this is a good idea.

I think the gradeless pilot program is amazing, and not just because you don't get graded by your teacher. When most people get a grade on their writing they aren't motivated to write anything else. They think a grade is the ending point. It doesn't have to be that way. With the new program, you receive suggestions and feedback. You can expand on your writing.

Many authors started just like you. A person who wanted someone else to judge their writing. Judge your writing yourself! You don't need anyone to do it for you. If you like the way your story sounds, and you like your writing, then it's good. You give feedback to yourself.

Another reason the gradeless program is a good idea is because everyone is at different levels. Some students have different goals for themselves. With grades, there is no way to change the meaning of that number for someone else who is at a different stage.

With grades, I feel judged. With comments, I feel like someone has my back. Also, you see your writing through another person's eyes. You may get more ideas with their help! You can become a better writer! In fact, the comments you get will help you on your next piece of writing.

Unfortunately, some people get the wrong ideas about the gradeless program. Here are some examples. You might understand the program, but your parents might not. Your parents probably need a little reminder that you're not getting grades sometimes because they might ask you what you got, but otherwise they get the program. In reality, you might not be used to it, and your parents might be okay with it.

Another example some students argue is that some kids may feel lost. They may be very confused with how well they did on their piece of writing. That's not valid. You should know whether your writing was great or maybe lacking something, because you wrote it. Besides, school isn't for you to get a grade from your teacher, it's for growing as an individual. School is for you, not for you to try to get the teacher to say 'yes'.

In my opinion, you don't need grades to be successful in school. You just need to think. Try more than your best. But don't think that no grades means that you can slack off. In my opinion, the gradeless pilot program is a great idea. You can get farther in your life without grades.
